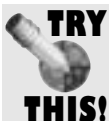

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2. Do you believe that the lesson in this folktale is important only to Korean people? Explain your answer.

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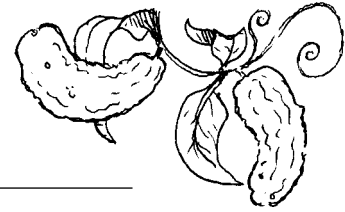

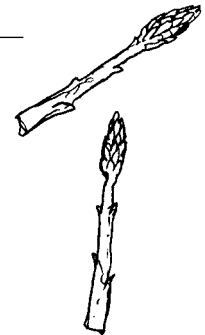
